There is good news for us about crime in our neighborhood. We were told by the APD that our property crime is down again and it is because of our community efforts. Land Use Update

primary editor or newsletter committee chair, now is the blast, as we quickly got ready for the EPC hearing for the proposed Walmart. We were fortunate that the hearing was moved from January 5th to January 19th. This helped us avoid the holidays and gave everyone time to prepare for the hearing.

> The Environmental Planning Commission (EPC) hearing began at 3:00pm in the San Miguel room at the Albuquerque Convention Center. There were well over 600 people who attended the hearing. Six hundred chairs were set up and still many people had to stand because there were not enough seats. There were 132 speakers who signed up to speak. The hearing lasted over 10 hours. There were still people speaking at midnight.

development. Included were representatives from the Taylor Ranch NA, La Luz Property Owners, La Luz del Sol NA, Las Casitas del Rio I&II HOA, Andalucia NA, Santa Fe Village NA, the Oxbow NA, the Westside Coalition, North Valley NA's, North Valley businesses, Westside businesses, Open Space Alliance, and Bosque School parents. The community was very concerned about the proposed development.

Here is a sample of the comments raised: there were concerns about traffic congestion, crime, public safety, pedestrian safety, close proximity to the Bosque and Bosque School, the sale of alcohol, and firearms. The Walmart proposal also does not comply with the Comprehensive plan, the Westside Strategic plan, the Coors Corridor Plan, which are City adopted plans that promote pedestrian friendly development, view protection, and plaza design. The proposal does not follow the approved 2005 Andalucía design standards, which calls for a village style development to complement the La Luz town homes, and Bosque School. There were concerns about a 24 hour store with 24 hour lighting. There are concerns about Coors and Montano being one of the five most congested corridors in the City, all being river crossings, with the Coors/ Montano intersection being #2 on the list, (article in the Journal- December 29, 2011). Speakers also pointed out that the Journal ran another story November 11, 2011 about the "Mayor's ABQ plan-Bosque initiative to spur development near river crossings to provide recreation and refreshment opportunities for Bosque visitors." This site would lend itself to that vision. An architect showed a power point presentation at the hearing which displayed how a village style development would look. Village style consists of a pedestrian friendly development not an auto oriented development.

Another power point was presented on the Bosque Education Monitoring Program (BEMP) which is an education program that teaches Bosque School students, and other students from around the state how to monitor the health and look for environmental impacts to the Bosque.

Representatives from the West Bluff NA, and Ladera NA also testified that they did not support the proposed Walmart project. They were also promised a nice village nightmare when the Walmart was built at Coors and I-40. The Coors and I-40 interchange was built, with the taxpayers footing the bill, to help ease the traffic, but the

area is still a traffic nightmare. They pointed out that big box developments tend to generate more traffic, and should not be built at intersections that provide the only access to the river crossings. Several speakers also pointed out that the Walmart proposal does not follow the Big Box ordinance. There is no direct primary or full access to a collector road for a big box retail development which is required in the big box ordinance. Delivery trucks and commercial traffic will have a difficult time driving along narrow roadways and around two traffic circles to get to and from the Learning/ Dellyne/ Coors intersection which has a traffic light. This will place an added traffic burden for La Luz residents, Bosque School, and the proposed apartments who depend on this intersection to get to Coors Blvd.

Small business representatives from the Westside and North Valley testified that Walmart may claim they provide new jobs, but studies demonstrate that for every 2 jobs created, 3 are lost. Low wages force Walmart employees to rely on subsidized health care. Out of state corporations such as Walmart are not required to pay state corporate income tax on profits made here in New type development. Instead they ended up with a traffic Mexico. Instead these taxes are sent to their corporate

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home state, whereas local businesses pay their tax revenues to New Mexico. A small business owner testified that years ago when she owned a small business at Artrisco Plaza, Walmart employees told her and the other local business owners, that Walmart would put them out of business. Many did go out of business.

Towards the end of the evening, the attorney for Bosque School explained why Bosque School withdrew their opposition to the proposed Walmart project. He read his statement that said "on January 17th, 2012, (two days before the hearing) they received a statement from Silver Leaf Ventures LLC, construing that a 2005 real estate purchase agreement between the two parties requires Bosque School to support Silver Leaf development. Bosque School intends to seek prompt declaratory relief with the Courts construing the terms of the purchase agreement. Therefore in light of a potential litigation Bosque School withdraws its opposition to the project at this time."

The only one who spoke in support of the project was a speaker near the end of the hearing. He read a letter from the Westside Chamber of Commerce to be put into the record. It said: "The Westside Chamber of Commerce supports the proposed Walmart at Coors and Montano, because it will add badly needed jobs for the Westside, provide economic opportunities, and relieve the burden on needs to be protected, and it should follow the Coors the Neighborhoods at West Bluff and Cottonwood areas Corridor Plan. 
